PARTNERS IN SERVICE

DEAR FRIENDS,

In our earliest days, The Free Clinic's essential partners consisted of the volunteer doctors, nurses, and social workers who were drawn to the modest house on Cornell Road in University Circle to offer compassionate counseling and limited medical care to patients. However, to acquire the necessary funding to sustain operations, and to achieve a buffer of acceptance by law enforcement and other traditional sources of power, broader cooperation was needed. The Cleveland Foundation, leaders in the legal and business community, such as Charlie Clarke, from Squire Sanders & Dempsey, the Cleveland Police Department, and community "gap bridgers," like Jeanne Sonville and Gordon Friedman, all formed the network of partnerships that has fostered the long-term success of The Free Clinic.

William Doll wrote about this partnership in his 1983 article for Foundation News, Money Isn't Everything. In it, he quotes Bruce Newman, the Cleveland Foundation staff officer who became a central force for the Clinic. "It was a perfect combination. The community people, including Sonville, had the trust of the kids who were using drugs and they had the knowledge of the treatment needs. We had the money and the ability to say to the police and others 'cool it.' Without one or the other, you couldn't have done it."

Today, although many of the faces and institutions have changed, the need for partnerships is equally great. At the time of our founding, there were no "conversion foundations," such as the St. Luke's, Mount Sinai Health Care, and Sisters of Charity foundations. Our relationships with the area hospitals, the Academy of Medicine, and other institutional sources of volunteer medical professionals were tenuous, at best. However, as we have evolved, so have our linkages in the rest of the community. We receive vital services from

and offer invaluable training to students in our local medical, dental, and ancillary health care schools. Our hospital partners provide much needed in-kind contributions and their residents help us to deliver medical and behavioral health services to thousands of patients. Our circle of financial supporters has broadened substantially. And the list goes on.

This year's report highlights just a few of those essential partnerships that allow The Free Clinic to remain a respected and relevant source of health care and related services for the more than 10,000 people we served in fiscal 2008. If you are not a partner with The Free Clinic in some way, we hope that the examples contained in this report will inspire you to become one.



THE CLEVELAND CLINIC



DELOS 'TOBY' COSGROVE, Delos "Toby" Cosgrove, MD, President & CEO of the Cleveland Clinic, began his medical career as an Air Force doctor serving in Viet Nam. There, he spent more time with a wrench in his hands than a scalpel, as he helped set up an obstetrics hospital in that war-torn country. One enduring lesson from that experience was the realization that Vietnam needed a reliable public health system much more than they needed heart surgery.

Today, Dr. Cosgrove leads an institution that is part of the lifeblood of Cleveland, both as a provider of world class healthcare, as well as a major component of the region's economic health. The impact of the Cleveland Clinic is magnified through its many alliances and partnerships, including its key connections to The Free Clinic.

For more than two years, the Cleveland Clinic has absorbed the cost of providing virtually all lab services required for Free Clinic patients – valued at more than \$200,000 during the period. Lerner Medical School students gain valuable experience volunteering at The Free Clinic, which Dr. Cosgrove believes will be invaluable to them in the long run. "The more places they can get varied exposure," he observes "the better physician they will be." In addition, experienced Cleveland Clinic specialists, such as rheumatology expert, Gary Hoffman, MD, have added value to the partnership by providing a range of medical services at The Free Clinic that would not otherwise be available to our patients.

Beyond these in-kind and volunteer contributions, the Cleveland Clinic has made a significant financial commitment to The Free Clinic's financial wellbeing. Dr. Cosgrove is serving as a co-chair of The Free Clinic's \$4 million Endowment Campaign, which the Cleveland Clinic has supported with a \$150,000 pledge. This pledge is over and above the \$50,000 in operating support provided during FY 2008.

Why partner with The Free Clinic? "We're all involved in this community and in healthcare," Dr. Cosgrove said of his institution's relationship with The Free Clinic. "Collaboration is the name of the game. It's part of being a responsible corporate citizen."

UNIVERSITY HOSPITALS

THOMAS F. ZENTY, III, Chief Executive Officer of University Hospitals, knew that he wanted to be a hospital administrator when he was just 15 years old.

Zenty grew up in a rural town in northeastern Pennsylvania, where realizing this dream would not be a simple matter. However, a local physician in his hometown saw potential in the young Zenty and agreed to take him on as a protégé of sorts. Zenty was permitted to accompany his mentor on hospital rounds and gained valuable experience and insight into the life of a physician and his patients. While Zenty acquired great respect and appreciation for the medical field, he also discovered that his real passion was the business principles that underlie and impact the delivery of patient care. He carried that passion with him into a successful career that has included leadership roles in a number of health systems.

During his tenure at Cedars-Sinai Health System in Los Angeles, Zenty became well acquainted with the critical role free clinics play in serving as a safety net within the healthcare delivery system and became a staunch supporter of the services they provide. Zenty's support of free clinics and their mission has remained steadfast, and since his arrival at University Hospitals in 2003 as its CEO, he has demonstrated that support to a grateful Free Clinic.

Historically, UH has provided has provided laboratory services for the benefit of Free Clinic patients both directly and through its affiliate, St. Vincent Charity Hospital. In addition, many of the internal medicine, family medicine and pediatric residents being trained at UH rotate through The Free Clinic, primarily serving patients in the Teen Clinic.

UH is also a key stakeholder in The Free Clinic's Endowment Campaign, pledging \$150,000 plus an additional \$50,000 in operating support during the 2008 fiscal year. This partnership with UH is vital to The Free Clinic and its continued outreach efforts in the community. Zenty sees the investment as highly beneficial to the broader community as well. "We believe in and support the mission of The Free Clinic," says Zenty. "The benefit that The Free Clinic brings to Cleveland and the community as a critical component of the primary care system is immeasurable. Our entire community enjoys better health as a result of the efforts of this fine organization."

CWRU SCHOOL OF MEDICINE

Each fiscal year, nearly 140 1st and 2nd year medical students volunteer their time at The Free Clinic to gain valuable hands-on experience to supplement their classroom learning at the Case Western Reserve University School of Medicine (CWRU SOM). Students are trained to serve as medical history takers, pharmacy technicians, HIV test counselors, outreach educators, substance abuse treatment intake workers, clinical coordinator aides, Patient Assistance Program ambassadors, and Syringe Exchange Program workers. The average medical student contributes approximately 8-10 hours of volunteer service each month for a three-month commitment. In addition, approximately forty 3rd and 4th year CWRU SOM students completed clinical electives at The Free Clinic in FY08. These students received direct clinical experience in treating patients under the supervision of our staff physicians. In total for FY08, medical students (CWRU and others) contributed 10,583 volunteer hours - a value of more than \$322,000. [Note: While CWRU provided the vast majority of med student rotations, we sporadically hosted students from seven other med schools.]

CWRU SCHOOL OF DENTAL MEDICINE

The Case Western Reserve School of Dental Medicine supplies vital staffing support for both the daytime restorative clinic and the evening extraction clinic. The dental clinic relies heavily on student providers, under the supervision of a corps of volunteer dentists, to ensure the provision of quality services to patients. All fifteen volunteer dentists attain adjunct faculty appointment from the Dental School for mentoring and instructing dental students on site. In an average class of seventy-five students, more than 50% of the dental students will serve at The Free Clinic as they develop professionally.

CWRU's Dental School sends one 3rd year and one 4th year student each week to provide five consecutive days of service in our restorative clinic. These students receive clinical credit for their placement at The Free Clinic, where they perform dental exams, root canals, cleanings, and fillings. During the evening clinic, 3rd and 4th year students volunteer (without academic credit) to hone their surgical skills. In FY08, CWRU Dental students contributed 2,190 hours of volunteer service – a value of approximately \$73,870.

CONNECTING FOR A CAUSE: THE ASSOCIATE BOARD



THE ASSOCIATE BOARD'S ACTIVITIES ARE INTEGRAL IN RAISING FUNDS AND FRIENDS FOR THE FREE CLINIC.

Never underestimate the power of social networking to join people in a common cause. The Free Clinic's Associate Board, comprised of a growing group of enthusiastic young professionals, has elevated this idea to a fine art. Many Associate Board members were looking for meaningful avenues to channel their energy, creativity and altruistic spirit. The Associate Board's annual Microbrew event, which has been held for the last 10 years in November, attracts hundreds of friends, and friends of friends, to listen to great music, sample a variety of microbrews, and raise money to fund services at The Free Clinic. For many, this "party with a purpose" served as the launching pad for other volunteer activities on behalf of the Clinic.

"We're not at the Clinic volunteering with the patients, but we're making a difference," said Denise Kipfsthul, former Associate Board Chair, who once staffed a legal clinic in the former Free Clinic location. "We are raising funds and friends, and our contemporaries might be future donors or volunteers." Tracy Kipfstuhl, current Associate Board co-chair (and Denise's sister) agrees. "We're getting more and more people involved. I didn't really know about The Free Clinic until a friend invited me to an event," she said. "That was over two Microbrews ago." (Associate Board volunteer involvement time is often measured by the Microbrew event.)

Current Associate Board Chair Kip Bollin, a partner at Thompson Hine LLP, observes that while members come from an assortment of professional and personal backgrounds, "we all share a single interest in the mission of The Free Clinic: to provide health care to the uninsured and underserved residents in Northeast Ohio. We see the patients who benefit from The Free Clinic's work. We plan events, speak out and lead, and in the process, we prepare the next generation of board leadership."

The fresh perspectives and goodwill that members of the Associate Board spread throughout Northeast Ohio helps The Free Clinic stay connected and relevant to today's prospective volunteers and philanthropists.

Cleveland Institute of Dental-Medical Assistants Cleveland State University Cuyahoga Community College Kent State University Rainbow Babies and Children Remington College Senior Employment Center University of Akron During 2008, The Free Clinic worked with key partners such as the local Safety Net Providers Strategic Alliance, Ohio Association of Free Clinics, Ohio Health Care Coverage Reform Advisory Committee, Ohio Family Coverage Coalition, and The National Association of Free Clinics to educate and influence decision makers about health care reform. The Free Clinic's involvement in local, state, and national advocacy has contributed to policy positions and strategies to promote free and affordable health care to benefit uninsured and underinsured individuals in the following ways:

NATIONAL

Our partnership with the National Association of Free Clinics allowed us to save more than \$12,000.00 through the acquisition of donated pharmaceuticals during FY 2008. The FreeClinicLink program is a web-based tool that connects medical donors with members of the National Association of Free Clinics (NAFC). The tool enables free clinics nationwide to receive donations of medical products and to purchase medical products at discounted rates.

Our involvement with The National Association of Free Clinics also facilitated our current efforts to qualify for malpractice coverage for our medical providers under the Federal Tort Claims Act. Once this process is complete, we should be able to redirect a portion of the nearly \$60.00 we currently pay for malpractice insurance premiums to direct patient care.

STATE

In 2008, Governor Strickland securitized funds from the Tobacco Settlement in order to stimulate economic development in the state. In doing so, free clinics all over the state risked losing substantial sums of money. Together with The Ohio Association of Free Clinics and others, we lobbied The Department of Health to successfully ensure that both The Cleveland Free Clinic and the Ohio Association of Free Clinics remained in the Ohio Department of Health's fiscal year 2008 – 2009 budget. Thousands of uninsured patients throughout Ohio benefitted from such activism.

LOCAL

At the 2008 Human Services Institute, we convened local, state and national representatives to participate in a 90 minute program titled: "Uninsured Ohioans: An Analysis of the Costs and an Overview of Proposed Solutions." Danny Williams moderated the panel of experts which included Karen Schwartz, Kaiser Family Foundation; William Hayes, PhD, President of the Health Policy Institute of Ohio; and Steven Millard, Executive Director of the Council of Smaller enterprises.

In 2008 The Free Clinic began a series of executive briefings. The first one, in May, was hosted by Frank Sullivan, CEO of RPM, International. The briefing allowed us to share with a range of business leaders information about the breadth of our services and the role we play as part of an enlightened long-range economic development strategy that emphasizes a healthy and productive workforce. A second briefing was held for public officials and a future session is planned for the faith community.

National and local shortages of primary care providers hampered certain key hiring priorities during the year; however, many dedicated volunteers stepped in to help bridge the gap. During 2009, we are working to open additional hours of service and to extend into the weekend to provide more opportunities to address the acute care needs of our patients.





LOOKING AHEAD

While 2008 proved to be a year of dramatic political and economic developments, it seems inevitable that the pace and scope of changes affecting health care delivery will be even more accelerated over the next several years. Looking ahead to fiscal year 2010, we will be sharing periodic updates about how local and national reform efforts will affect the direction and operations at your Free Clinic. The following are among the initiatives you'll be hearing about:

- Cuyahoga Health Access Partnership (formerly the Medical Home Initiative) is an effort spearheaded by the Cuyahoga County Board of County Commissioners and funded, in part, by The St. Luke's Foundation, to lessen unnecessary and inefficient use of emergency rooms to treat chronic conditions, and to improve the continuity of care for uninsured and underinsured Cuyahoga County residents. The Free Clinic is an active participant in this planning process and will likely play an expanded role in coming years as a key safety net provider.
- Comprehensive Clinical Data-Sharing Network, an outgrowth of the work of the United Way Health and Wellness Vision Council, is designed to install and link electronic health records among the region's primary safety net facilities. The Free Clinic's lack of an electronic health record system limits our ability to track overall progress of our patient population and to easily share testing and other critical information with other institutions where patients also received care.
- National and State Health Care Reform Efforts will require particular attention to ensure that free clinics are effectively incorporated into any comprehensive reform models. Whatever the ultimate shape of any new system, it will necessarily require delivery points at the local level. We will need to carefully analyze what, if any, modifications may be necessary to retain our relevance and impact in any new healthcare delivery system.
- Fund for The Free Clinic's Future, our Skirball Foundation-inspired endowment campaign, remains less than \$85,000 away from our next \$500,000 matching grant. As the economy continues to improve, we will be reaching out to our old and new friends to complete this campaign to ensure The Free Clinic's long-term viability.
- National Association of Free Clinics 2010 Summit, a gathering of more than 400 staff and volunteers from free clinics around the country, will be taking place in the fall of 2010 in Cleveland. This unique opportunity to convene thought leaders from around the nation and to showcase the many assets of Greater Cleveland will require much thoughtful planning and collaboration with key healthcare partners from around the region.
